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BEING GIFTED Uniqueness

Marie Curie was a gifted scientist. Together with her husband, she made very important scientific discoveries. She was the first female ever to receive the Nobel Prize. Listen to what she says about being gifted:

We must believe we are gifted for something.

Today, remember you are gifted for something and inside you is a special gift only you can give the world — no one else — only you. What do you think your gift might be?

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Pablo Casals was a world-famous Spanish musician and writer. Now listen to these words he wrote in a piece titled "You Are a Marvel":

... Do you know what you are? You are a marvel. You are unique. In all the years that have passed, there has never been another [young person] like you. Your legs, your arms, your clever fingers, the way you move. You may become a Shakespeare, a Michelangelo, a Beethoven. Yes, you are a marvel. And when you grow up, can you then harm another who is, like you, a marvel?

Pablo Casals is saying that each one of you is filled with wonder. Each one of you is special. So how can you grow up and be hurtful to someone else who is a special, one-of-a-kind person, too?

Today, let's treat each other like the special, one-of-a-kind human beings we are, and always search for kind and peaceful ways to live together.

With something to think about, this is <u>name of narrator</u>. Make it a great day . . . or not. The choice is yours.

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A famous Spanish writer, Juan Mascaro, once said:

Each one of us is a unique event in the universe.

Let's think about that. With more than seven billion people on the planet, there is no one else in the whole of the universe that is YOU except YOU. That means that no one else can do what YOU can do. No one else can be what YOU can be. No one else can do exactly what YOU do because YOU have your own special way of doing it.

Today, look around; notice how each person is one-of-a-kind. It's truly amazing.

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Most of us have been teased before. Teasing is a funny thing . . . or is it? When someone is being teased, people often laugh as if something funny is happening, but the truth is, teasing usually hurts. "Oh, I was just teasing," people say, but that doesn't make it feel any better, does it?

Listen to some good advice:

Be kind to your school friends, and never tease them.*

Are you someone who teases your friends? If you do, stop for a moment and think about the way you would feel if you were being teased. Today and every day, let's treat each other with respect. Don't try to be funny by saying hurtful things.
